STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE: The Hyde Park Historic District is significant as a well-preserved late nineteenth century rural village. It is situated on a bluff to the north of the Lamoille River. The county's main arterial highway, Vt. Rt. 15, bypasses the village a quarter mile to the north. Hyde Park's quiet, easy ambiance was the subject of a 1972 "On the Road" episode by CBS's Charles Kuralt, who described it as one of the towns in the country that he would most like to live in.


The district encompasses all but a dozen or so of the structures within the incorporated village limits. The street configuration consists of an east-west axis, Main Street, which forks at either end, and has perpendicular side streets connecting from both the north and south. The focal point of the district is the Lamoille County Courthouse (#48), a large Romanesque-style brick building which is set back from the south side of Main Street near the center of the village. Another brick county building (#49) and the palatial Page Mansion (#53), a large Georgian Revival style house, are also set back from Main Street to the west of the courthouse. The combined expanse of these three buildings' front lawns creates the effect of a public common, an effect which is reinforced by the presence of a number of other public buildings fronting on the open space to the north and west.

To the east of the courthouse is the village's commercial area, comprised of seven or eight buildings, some of a commercial type, and some converted from residential use. The remaining sections of the district are predominantly residential in character. Of these, the most important are Church Street, which is lined with closely-spaced dwellings, mostly vernacular in style, and dating from 1850-80; Commonwealth Avenue, behind the courthouse, which was developed from 1885-1915, has the village's greatest concentration of late Victorian

BOUNDARY DESCRIPTION: The Hyde Park Historic District boundary begins at Point A, the northeast corner of the Bailey property (#138). The boundary thence proceeds generally south along the rear property line of said property and the Tallman property (#140) to Point B, the intersection of the rear property lines of the Tallman (#140) and the Stygles property (#5). The boundary thence proceeds generally northeast along the rear property lines of #5 and #8 to a Point C, at the northeast corner of the Noyes-Parker House property (#8), thence runs southeast along the east property line of said property, crosses Upper Main Street, and meets Point D, the northeast corner of the Ellenwood-Stygles property (#9). The boundary thence proceeds in a southerly direction along the rear (eastern) property lines of #9-18 and 19, to a Point E, located at the southeast corner of the Noyes-Sargent property (#18 & 19). residences; and lower Main Street, at the west end of the district, has a half a dozen houses of similar style and construction, dating from the Civil War era.

Ninety percent of all contributing structures in the district were built between the years 1850 and 1915, a fact reflected in the village's architecture. The most frequently recurring stylistic feature is the use of turned and scroll-cut ornament, employed in picturesque and eclectic motifs, particularly on residential porches. In general, styles and construction are vernacular adaptations of higher styles. The temple front form of the Greek Revival period was especially popular in Hyde Park, and was retained by builders virtually until the turn of the century. Another common characteristic of the district is the use of carriage houses and stables as ells and wings adjoined to the rear of dwellings. Separate outbuildings are also numerous, but generally classified as non-contributing unless of architectural interest. There are only four brick buildings in the district, none of them residential. Thus, clapboard facades are perhaps the most distinctive single trait of Hyde Park's built environment.

The year 1790 saw the first building erected in what is now Hyde Park Village. It stood on the present site of the Lamoille Central Academy (#12), at the east end of the district, on what was then a single road, now Eden-Depot Streets, running north-south. In 1800 a new east-west road was cut which in time became the focus of new development, and became known simply as "Hyde Park Main Street." This single street, lined with perhaps a score of houses, did not become a real village until 1836, when the legislature chose it as the site of the first courthouse for the newly-formed Lamoille County, an act which guaranteed the settlement's future growth and prosperity. The courthouse meant business for lawyers, innkeepers, and a printer, and brought in visitors and money from throughout the county. Still, for many years the village economy depended largely on its role as the commercial center for the surrounding agricultural district. With no millsites nearby, there was virtually no industrial activity in town until after the Civil War, when local blacksmiths began expanding into carriage manufacturing.

The coming of the Lamoille County Railroad and modern industrial methods in the 1870's triggered Hyde Park's single greatest period of prosperity, and by the turn of the century the village had expanded to its present size. The most important business in town was the calfskin tannery of Carroll S. Page, which was the largest in the world at one time. The wealth and public visibility which Page acquired in his business successes became the platform for a long political career, including a term as governor and two terms in the United States Senate.

The historic event which had the greatest impact on the district's present appearance was the fire of 1910. This conflagration began at the old courthouse (site of present courthouse), and swept westward and northward until it eventually destroyed a score of buildings on either side of Main Street. The Page Mansion was spared, but only, according to some sources, because most of the limited water available to the fire department went on the Senator's roof, at the expense of the rest of the village. Thus a large number of buildings in that part of the district, most of them Colonial Revival in style, date from the years 1911-15.

The most significant individual structures in the district are the aforementioned courthouse and Page Mansion, and the Lamoille Central Academy (#12), a large clapboard structure which commands an axial view of Main Street. Other significant public buildings are the Classical Revival-style Lamphere Library (#95), the Georgian Revival-style Lamoille County Playhouse (#91), and two Gothic Revival style churches, the Second Congregational (#72) and St. Theresa's (#80). Except for the Screener's Ink Building (#33), all of the district's commercial structures have suffered substantial alteration, with changes to the P.H. Edwards Building (#122) being the most noticeable, due to its great size and central location. Of the residences, the most significant besides the Page Mansion are the McFarland House (#88), a large Colonial Revival-style house with matching carriage house, built at the west end of the district after the fire of 1910; the Noyes-Martin House (#1); and the Sawyer-Deuso House (#129), the oldest unaltered building in the district. Of the ubiquitous temple front house types, which in some form number almost forty in the district, dating from the 1830's to the 1890's, the most stylish and well-preserved are the Noyes-Sargent House (#18), the Hyde-French House (#34), the Childs-Baker House (#47), the Sargent Harvey House (#78), the Lilley-Potter House (#94), and the Randall-Gminder House (#128).

generally west along the southerly property line of said property, crosses Depot Street, continues along the southerly property line of the Hogan House (#20) and continues generally west, along a line which includes all the property of #21-60, to a Point F, at the southeast corner of the Staples property (#60). The boundary thence runs northwest, along the rear property line of #62 and the west property line of the Page-Southern House (#81), crosses Lower Main Street, and continues along the west property line of the Lamaille County Activity Center (#82), to a Point G, the northwest corner of said property. From Point G, the district boundary runs northeast along the rear property lines of #82-85, crosses the Johnson Road, and continues along the west property line of the Lamphere House (#87) and the Village Cemetery (#104) to a Point H, at the northwest corner of the cemetery. From Point H, the boundary runs east along the north line of the cemetery and the Safford Outbuilding property (#105), crosses Church Street, and continues along the north property line of the Thomas House (#106) to a Point I, at the northeast corner of said property. From Point I, the boundary runs south, along the rear property lines of #106-118 to a Point J, at the rear property line of the P.H. Edwards Furniture Building (#122). The boundary thence turns east and runs along the rear property lines of #122-127 to a Point K, at the rear property line of the Cobleigh-Knowlton House (#132). From Point K the boundary runs north along the rear property lines of #132-137 to a Point L, at the northwest corner of the Mason property (#137). The boundary thence proceeds east along the north line of said property, crosses Eden Street, and continues along the north property line of the Bailey House (#138) to Point A, the point of beginning.

DESCRIPTION: A 2-story clapboard house with Greek Revival style cornice and entrance detail. The 4x2 bay rectangular plan has eaves-front orientation on Eden Street, and a formal entrance located atypically at the extreme right of the facade. It was built in 1840 by Lucius Noyes, a merchant, banker, and Hyde Park's most successful businessman until his death. Noyes ran a large store on the corner to the south; the house and store were connected by a shed for hitching teams, which explains the lack of fenestration on the south gable end. A large east ell extending down Upper Main Street has a recessed 6x4 bay veranda on tapered round posts along the south and east sides, and a recessed balcony with turned balustrade in the east gable, and a row of gabled dormers along the south roof slope, all added c.1900. portico, both added c.1975, project on the north side of the ell. The two buildings to the north (#2 and #140) were also part of the large Noyes complex on this corner. The store was torn down early in this century when the advent of heavy trucks made its location a traffic hazard. Stylistic detail on the main block of the house includes a molded box cornice with end returns supported by corner pilasters, and a recessed entrance with panelled door and reveals, sidelights, and a surround of pilasters supporting an entablature. Sash is 2/2, 6/6 in gables. Some original interior detail remains.

Other detail includes cornice returns, diamond gable windows, and bay openings on the north and south sides. The building's frame is possibly a remnant of the old Hyde Park village school, which stood on or near this site for most of the nineteenth century.

DESCRIPTION: A 1½-story clapboard with a modified Classic Cottage plan of only 3x2 bays and a long east wing. Stylistic detail includes corner pilasters, cornice with frieze boards and end returns, and peaked headboards over 2/2 sash and doors. The plan and style are typical of late Greek Revival period vernacular architecture. The wing is faced with a 3-bay shed porch with chamfered and banded posts. A large multi-paned picture window on the wing and gabled dormers on the front roof slopes of the wing and main block are recent intrusions. The earliest known occupants were A. Dwinell, for whom the house was probably built, in 1857, and a Mrs. Bennett, in 1878. Along with #8, 10, and 11, it extends the historic character of Hyde Park Village to the east along Upper Main Street.

Corner pilasters supporting a molded cornice with frieze boards are the only stylistic elements to survive a series of facade alterations, including a new door with pedimented entrance porch on turned posts, some new windows, and a 1-story gabled ell with entry which projects to the west. Most windows have original 2/2 sash and plain surrounds. Despite the alterations and the generally vernacular appearance, the typical period massing and clapboard exterior help maintain the district's historic character. It was built sometime shortly after 1857, and in 1878 was part of the Lucius Noyes Estate (see #1).

The slightly projecting eaves are supported by Queen Anne-style brackets mounted on a shingle-enriched frieze. Regularly-spaced windows have tall 2/1 sash and molded heads, some paired and 3-part. The tower has an 8-sided slate roof with finial and exposed rafter ends; below is a belfry with shingle siding and 3-part round-arched openings. Rising above the entrance is a clerestory-like wall dormer with an unusual Elizabethan gable, delicate dentil molding under the eaves, and an elaborate Palladian window with denticulation and decorative spandrel panels. Lamoille Central Academy was built in 1898 to provide more room for the town high school, which had previously met on the second floor of the old town hall. As district schools closed in the 20th century, it gradually incorporated all the town's students, and in 1951 the brick annex (#13), adjoined to the south side, was added. Now an elementary school. It resembles the Johnson Central School, built at the same time, and may have been the work of the same architect, Z.T. Austin of Burlington.

DESCRIPTION: A well-preserved, 1½-story, clapboard house, of the Greek Revival "temple front" type. Corner pilasters support a cornice with frieze; the side hall entrance has a cross-and-Bible panelled door, 3/4 sidelights, and a peaked cornice. Sash is all 6/6 with peaked heads, except for a number of 4/4 kneewall windows under the eaves. The main block has a rectangular 3x5 bay plan with inside end chimneys; in the rear is a slightly lower and narrower wing, 2x5 bays, with an on-ridge chimney. Along the east side of the wing is a 4-bay shed porch on chamfered posts, serving a panelled side door. The house is a virtual stereotype of one of the most common residential building types in 19th century Vermont. It was probably built c.1860 for Pember R. Sargent, a teamster and farmer.

COMMON NAME: St. Theresa's Church OWNER: R.C. Diocese of Burlington

DESCRIPTION: A 30'x20' Gothic Revival-style clapboard church. The frame and probably the exterior design date from 1871, but it was almost 20 years before the building, particularly the interior, was completed. The 3x3 bay plan is rectangular except for a belltower centered on the front gable, and a small wing adjoined to the southeast corner. The main Gothic stylistic elements are pointed arch fenestration and buttresses on the tower. The entrance, at the tower base, has double doors, an arched stained glass transom, and a broad drip molding with trefoil crown and turned labels. Lancet windows on the side elevations and flanking the front entrance have stained glass and identical
